

The Peru Republican.

The paper was established in 1850 by the late E. P. Loveland, who conducted it with marked ability for a few seasons and then sold the office to W. A. Hudman, who is now publishing a newspaper at Grand Rapids, Michigan.—A newspaper was bought in stock by H. S. Chapman who introduced it until March, 1852, when it was bought by Ward & Brown. At this time the subscriber had contributed about \$2000, the number of copies printed to supply exchanges, advertisers, and subscribers, was 400. To a successful effort to establish advances payment of subscriptions Mr. Chapman had succeeded in raising off some days last fall the subscribers, but the increase in the popularity of the paper was so great that its policy entitles it to a larger sum than the original advance. A newspaper that draws out regular advertising profits of subscribers has no feasible plan for prosperous publication.

The paper has rapidly increased under the management of Ward & Brown, and has increased until the present. At the end of one year, L. M. Brown sold his interest to G. I. Reed, who carried on the proprietorship until May, 1872, when he sold a half interest to M. R. Sinks (deceased) of the Coopersville, Texas, Reed & Sinks are the proprietors and G. I. Reed the editor.

The Republic is in its 23d volume; is printed on a Coddell & Nichols cylinder, green paper by a steam power. The office occupies a basement and conveniently arranged back building situated on the page, on the corner of Main and Court streets, owned by the editor and his wife, for the printing, stationery and book stores. The office is furnished with over forty case cabinets, a large number of wood and metal types, two flat mortising lath presses, a Watch stain engine and much other material as reduces into complete sets.
