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If Ray Smith used different lamp eve day, it would take h almost a year to lig them all.

For the past 40 year Smith, a retired emplo of an area church fur iture firm, has collected lamp parts--art glated and painted china shadted and bases, etched brain frames and crystaprisms. With patience skill and love of his craft, he has used the parts to create electrified works of art, each wired so that the bas or the top can be lighted separately or together.

RAY SMITH is shown with more products of his handicraft. The pattern of the pair of lamps is "Thousand Eye", a hard to produce item that required stretching of the glass. Similar lamps can no longer by produced because of the lack of brass frames and the glass itself."

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SCENES FROM THE BIBLE are painted on this china lamp that stands on a poker table that is over 100 years old. Taken from an old Mississippi River paddle boat, the table is constructed with a hinged top that can be turned to convert the table for card playing, aprocess that reveals hidden compartments for four decks of cards, poker chips and a whiskey bottle. Nowused in its fliptop position, the table was refinished by Smith who also refinished and reupholstered the chair, Lamp, table and chair all reflect his strict attention to detail and adherence to period.

The land was sold from the United States

to William Blue Sept. 2, 1839

to Benjamin Blue 1844

to John VanTreese March 18, 1848

to John Morgan Aug. 17. 1850

to Catherine Mrogan 1879

to Albert Tucker April 6, 1882

VanTre se was a relative of the Blue's. John and Catherine Morgan were great-grandparents of Ray Smith. When John's estate was settled, the widow received this portion.

John Morgan was the son of Griffith and Jane (Longmore) Morgan who came to the United States from Wales. Catherine Morgan was the daughter of George and Lydia (Anderick) Sarber. Both the Sarbers and were pioneer settlers on farms southwest of Mentone.

Albert Tucker, George Myers, and William Hackedorn laid out the lots in Mentone on land purchased from Catherine Morgan and others. Mentone grew like a mushroom. In three years the population increased to 600.

George Myers was an ancestor of Terry Hammer.

A Frenchman named Doane is credited with building the house, and records show Clarence and Maey Doane owned the property in 1891. There were several owners and mortgages in this period.

Correction: Under the window it says "Albert Tucker A.D. 1898", instead of on the cornerstone.

This Albert Tucker was born in Richalnd Co., O. in 1831 and came to Indiana as a young man. By the 1880's he had acquired considerable rich land near the present Tippecanoe Valley High School.

Among the businesses in the new town of Mentone was an elevator built by Albert Tucker.

Widower Albert Tucker married Mary Odel Baker, Dec. 28, 1897.

We are told that in the old gable houses, that's the way they told the wealth of people: Five was just ordianry plain people, seven was middle class people and nine gables was rich people. Some people call this a nine gable house.

The high ceilings, transoms, wide wooden trimm and brick are typical of houses of the late 19th Century.

The front window of the parlor has some colored glass. Tucker added the kitchen and small room at the back to replace the lean-to. The bricks came from Akron.

An 1898 newspaper reported the sinking of the battleship Maine which started the Spanish American War. The coke that was advertised was to burn, not to drink. New suits for men cost approximately \$20. Ladies outfits probably came from the dressmakers, and were long skirts with

a pouched blouse trimmed with ruffles, lace or emproidery. The millinery shops had an assortment of hats, decorated with feathers, ribbons or flowers. Parasols, muffs and lorgnettes were used in this period.

Present Mentone residents remember that Mrs. Tucker used the side porch, had had green blinds in the parlor which she kept pulled. Perhaps she used it for a bedroom. She had ferns and some flowers in the back year.

Ray and Iris Smith moved to this house more than Chirty years ago. They bought it from Mrs. Tucker's heirs.

Ray is the son of Ora and Pearl (Morgan) Smith. His paternal grandfather, John C. Smith came to Indiana from Union Co., Pa. when he was seven. After he returned from the Civil War, he married and lived south of Mentone. Ray's grandmother, Silcece (Raber) Smith cooked for some of the men who were building the Nickle Plate Railroad. The rialroad was finished in Kosciusko County in July 1882.

Iris is the daughter of Chester and Winnie (Smith) Shamp of Akron. Her Grandfather Smith was a blacksmith. Her Grandfather Shamp was a carpenter and cabinet maker.

Ray and Iris opened the stairway and remeved doors to eliminate the boxed-in feeling.

Even before you enter their house you can see their love of beauty and color in the bright flower beds, and the lmaps in the window.

Ray makes the lamps. He buys art glass and painted china lamp parts and attaches the brass frames and crystal prisms. He also does the lighting and often the base or top can be lighted separately or together. Wiring

Ray and Iris started collecting glass 40 or 45 years ago.
