that has remained continuously. The parents and
six of the 10 sons are buried in the I.O.O.F. cemetery.

Abram. Those of the 3rd generation around the

Miss Sotta M. Whittenberger

Horse trading commenced at once most of the Indians were friendly although there were some that were hostile, in all things the Pilgrims acknowledged the Wisdom of God.

Isaac Sippy was a blacksmith, Jacob Whittenberger and his wife came in 1840. He was a pioneer cabinet maker + undertaker.

Wm Whittenberger Jr. was 1st mail carrier. It was to Fort Wayne, return to Newark then to Winona and return, made on foot over the Indian trail every 6 wks. Jacob Whittenberger was Postmaster.

Changed name of Newark to Akron about Jan 1, 1855.

In 1850 Thomas and Abram Whittenberger with 4 other men started to California. Two men died of Cholera and two others were murdered by claim jumpers. Whittenberger Bros' came back after an absence of 3 yrs.

In 1874 Jacob Whittenberger was appointed township trustee, Wm Trustee for 6 yrs.

and Anne.

Some of the families were natives of So. Easterly
Penn. & N.Y. came to Beaver Penn. in 1816.

Dr. Sippy was to brother of Mrs. ^{Annie} Whittenberger
There were 47 people constituted the colony.
Dr. Sippy was also the leader. They settled
where Akron is in 1836. They had travel 30
days with ox drawn wagons. They remembered
the Sabbath Day and at 4 p.m. halted their
wagons at the Crossing of the Trails (where
state Rds. 14 + 19 cross) climbed down from their
wagons and thanked the Heavenly Father for a
