HISTORICALLY, Mentone stands out! It came into being in 1882, when the small village of Yellow Creek uprooted itself and moved here to take advantage of a new railroad. The town was platted well in advance, allowing time for careful planning. The sawmill, which had provided ties for the railroad, became the area's first steam-powered grist mill, and Mentone was able to send refined flour back east over the new tracks. Ready markets and good soil were the basis for thriving agricultural endeavors. With a ready supply of grain, Mentone's economy is still largely based upon poultry and eggs, giving it the title, "Egg Basket of the Midwest."

With an abundance of creeks, rivers, and peaceful wooded areas, the community around Mentone has maintained its NATURAL BEAUTY despite the many acres under cultivation. Most of the farms can still be considered "family farms" and reflect the pride of resident owner/operators.

The outer edges of Mentone are dotted with light INDUSTRY employing much of the town's population of 912, and helping to fund tax-supported entities: an excellent school system and an outstanding library. Bell Public Library, a memorial to the parents of Lawrence Bell, maintains an up-to-date collection of over 28,000 items, serving the serious researcher as well as the patron looking for the latest novel or video movie.

Mentone, covering 1.5 square miles, is governed by a city council consisting of 3 members, serving 4-year terms. There are 399 housing units and 6 industrial firms in the town. There is a full-time police department and volunteers man the EMS and fire department. Municipal utilities include water, sewage, and trash collection.

In addition to popular burger, shake, and pizza establishments, you may expect good, country-style FOOD in Mentone. Visitors travel quite a distance for Teel's Friday and Saturday night buffets.
