George Washington's Farewell Address was delivered September 17, 1796—over one hundred and forty three years ago.

This great document is commonly accorded a place beside The Declaration of Independence, second only to the Constitution.

With almost uncanny accuracy, he foresaw many of the troubles that face us today.

He recommended "for our frequent review" many warnings of possible dangers, with suggestions how to guard against them.

For our frequent review—perhaps with the thought in mind that we may forget momentarily the indescribable sufferings and privations our forefathers endured in order to gain the freedom and liberty, which we enjoy today.

Maybe he foresaw possible foreign entanglements and their great danger to our happiness, prosperity and general welfare—

He certainly warned against the abuse of public credit and the accumulation of debt with which to burden posterity.

A lot of things are happening today that he apparently visioned when he delivered that famous address—

In this month of his two hundred and eighth birthday—it might be well to review the many pertinent things he outlined to us in this famous document.

It would be timely if every law-maker in this great land of ours would take time out and <u>read</u> this document—carefully—and ponder over it—they will find real guidance and inspiration in it.

It would do us all good—to re-read and ponder over a copy of Washington's Farewell Address.
