## **About Arthur Young**

Arthur M. Young, who devoted 15 years of his life in creating the Bell helicopter, was born in Philadelphia in 1905.

In 1927, he received a degree in mathematics from Princeton University. Three years later he had entered private research on a helicopter that would lead to the development of the Model 47.

In the late 1940s Young withdrew from the Bell company to devote his full time to a "synthesis of science and fundamental philosophy." To pursue this work he established the Institute for the Study of Consciousness in Berkeley, Ca. He and his wife, Ruth, divide the year between the Institute and their farm near Philadelphia.

Although Young is in his late 70s, his alert mind and boundless energy give you the impression that he could spend another 15 years inventing other revolutionary rotary wing products.

He is also the author of three books: "The Bell Notes". "The Reflexive Universe" and "The Geometry of Meaning".
