


In the corner of the arena you await your turn.



Record Breaking Season For Valley Volleyball

The 1998 Varsity and Junior Varsity Volleyball seasons were full of school records. The Lady Vikings Varsity season ended with a school record of 22 wins and 9 losses. (This shattered the old record of 16 wins from 1997.) The following individuals broke school records in their own right: Tiffany Cunningham — serve reception (90.55%), Inga Vandermark — service aces (64), Jennifer Studebaker — Blocks (155), Rhonda Doud — career assists (1176), and Jennifer Studebaker — kill efficiency (.198). In addition Brooke Fisher (first in kills with 189) became only the 2nd girl in Valley history to make the 1st team all TRC conference. Other girls on the varsity were Amy Nellans (2nd in both blocks and aces), Carissa Parker (2nd in assists and 3rd in serve re-

ception), Tara Baker (3rd in Blocking and kill efficiency), and Kim Carr. This year also marked another milestone for the Varsity as they were chosen as an outstanding team and featured in the magazine Volleyball.


The Junior Varsity had the best season it has ever had in Valley history with a final record of 23 wins and 5 losses. They took home the championship trophy at both the Triton and Fremont tournaments.

The season for the freshman was a growing experience that prepared them for the challenges of a higher level of competition. The final record for the 1998 season came out to be more about improving than about how to work better as a team and not who beat who.









Tippecanoe Valley Students Get Their "Kicks" Before School

It's 6:30 in the morning on a Tuesday and many students are just rolling out of bed, but some Valley students are already at school and working out. The past three years have seen a new club at Tippecanoe Valley, the Kickboxing Club.

The club began during the 1996-1997 school year as a way for Mr. Hutton, a new teacher to get a chance to continue working out in the martial arts that he had been studying for the last 12 years.

The club's goal is for stu-

dents to develop the ability to defend themselves if threatened. It focuses on students learning about self defense at the four different ranges of combat: kicking, punching, trapping, and grappling. Practicing these involves working with different equipment like focus mitts, gloves, thai pads, and kicking shields.

The source of the skills used in the club come from a variety of different martial arts. The first of the three main ones is Jeet Kune Do Concepts, the ideals of combat that Bruce

Lee developed before his death. Thai boxing, the second art is comprised of techniques from some of the toughest fighters in the world involving strikes with the elbow, knee, legs, and head. The final component art is the study of Kali and other Filipino Martial arts which have a long history of effectiveness in combat. This area consists of training with the main idea of "defanging the snake". This concept runs through the arts with impairing or stunning the limbs that people are attack-

ing with as well as throws and locks that control your opponent.

The different areas of these martial arts are practiced and tested in the ring. Unfortunately because of limitations this ring is actually the circle in the middle of the gym. Here though students use protective equipment to test their abilities against one another to hone and define their techniques.

Working with different equipment lets students try out their skills and feel what it is like to hit and kick without hurting or getting hurt




















