"Build a Better World" Summer Reading Program

The Summer Reading Program sign-ups have already started! The program officially starts on June 5 and ends on July 17. We are excited to welcome back the *ADULT* Summer Reading Program! We know that you are excited as well! Adults can sign up to read for prizes! Teens and adults can also

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Tips for Summer Gardening



- You should pick a place that gets plenty of morning sunshine and some afternoon shade.
- Remove about fourteen inches of native soil and install good planting soil.
 You will need to decide the size of your garden, so start modestly. You can always add to it later!
- 3. Limited rainfall and blazing summer sun requires a reliable watering system. It is easier to reduce sunlight than shade. Shade cloth is an easy inexpensive fix but placing the garden in the shade can rob plants of the sunlight they require. Just be mindful

- if you use shade cloth.
- 4. You need to have the right soil. After good planting soil is applied, improve the soil condition by applying lots of organic matter which improves nutrient and water holding capacity, drainage and aeration.
- 5. Mulching is covering the soil around the veggies, besides controlling weeds, the mulch will conserve moisture and regulate the soil temperature. You might spread straw, pine needles or other organic matter to a depth of about three inches, replenishing throughout the season as needed.
- Water just enough to keep the soil moist. Apply water regularly to keep the soil form becoming too dry.
- 7. Plants compete for water, nutrients and sunlight.

 Don't hesitate to thin plants that have been over seeded, or are too close to each other. Good air circulation between plants helps reduce insect and disease problems.


























Father's Day

The nation's first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, in the state of Washington. However, it was not until 1972–58 years after President Woodrow Wilson made Mother's Day official—that the day honoring fathers became a nation-wide holiday in the United States. On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in


memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday. The next year, a Spokane, Washington, woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went


to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful. Today, economists estimate that Americans spend more than \$1 billion each year on Father's Day gifts.


