The Origin of Halloween

Halloween's roots can be traced back to Celtic culture in Ireland. According to their "Druid" religion,

November 1st was New Years' on their calendar. The celebration would begin on October 31st ,and last into the following day. The spirits of all who died in the prior year, would rise up and roam the earth on this night.

This is an evil night when spirits roamed the streets and villages. Lord Samhain, the lord of Darkness, would arrive in search of the spirits to take them to the underworld.



Halloween as it is currently celebrated with costumes, trick or treat, and superstitions, takes from this Druid Holiday.¹

Hit the Road, Jack

The name "Jack-o'-lantern" has changed in meaning several times. It was first recorded as a nickname for a night watchman, dating back to 1663. Around the same time, it was used as another name for a will-o'-thewisp. It began to be used for pumpkin lanterns sometime in the 19th century. It's possible that the name simply went from the night watchman (a man holding a lantern) to the lantern itself.

Trick or Treat!

The general practice of going door-to-door for treats is clearly similar to a much older practice, "souling," in which the poor would go from house to house begging for alms or food. However, the specific practice of "trick-or-treating" dates to around the 1930s. It is possible—though by no means certain—that it evolved as an antidote for the increasingly rowdy and costly Halloween pranks. It provided a healthier activity for the young and gave them an incentive not to play tricks.²

Entries must be turned in by October 24th.


Winners will be announced on October 28th.

BANNED BOOKS WEEK

September 25th - October 1st, 2016

Censors are increasingly focusing on books that represent diverse points of view.

For as long as humans have printed books, censors have argued over their content and tried to limit some books' distribution. But the reasons for challenging literature change over time, and as Banned Book Week begins on Sept. 25, it's clear that public discomfort with particular ideas has evolved rapidly even in the last 20 years.


When the American Library Association started keeping a database of challenged books in the early '90s, the reasons cited were fairly straightforward, according to James LaRue, director of the ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom. "Don't like the language,' or 'There's too much sex'—they'd tend to fall into those two categories," he says. Some books are still challenged for those reasons—Fifty Shades of Grey is a common example. But there's been a shift toward seeking to ban books "focused on issues of diversity—things that are by or about people of color, or LGBT, or disabilities, or religious and cultural minorities," LaRue says. "It seems like that shift is very clear."³




THE LONG GAME by Jennifer L. Barnes


The Rules for Breaking by Ashley Elston




Apprentice In Death by J.D. Robb


by the people around us, there are those who are just born evil...



Home by Harlen Coben


